A SURVEY OF LIKELY NEW HAMPSHIRE VOTERS

SEPTEMBER 27-28, 2022

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SURVEY NOTES

These results are from the Saint Anselm College Survey Center poll based on online surveys of 901 likely New Hampshire voters. Surveys were collected between September 27th and 28th, 2022, from cell phone users randomly drawn from a sample of registered voters reflecting the demographic and partisan characteristics of the voting population. Names were presented in random order for the candidate image and the ballot test series. The survey has an overall margin of sampling error of +/- 3.3% with a confidence interval of 95%; the margin of sampling error for questions specific to congressional districts is +/- 4.9%. The data are weighted for age, gender, geography, and education based on a voter demographic model derived from historical voting patterns, but are not weighted by party registration or party identification.

SUMMARY OF FINDINGS


New Hampshire Institute of Politics Neil Levesque summarized the results, saying, "The bad news for Democratic incumbents is that their standing with voters is weak. The good news for Democratic incumbents is that their Republican challengers are even weaker. As we've been noting throughout the year, candidates and campaigns matter, and the tough and experienced Senator Maggie Hassan and Representatives Chris Pappas and Annie Kuster have made good use of the primary election period to shore up their support and define the battleground on which the general election will be fought."


- Governor Chris Sununu is in a strong position for re-election. Sununu currently holds a commanding 16-point lead (50%-34%) on the gubernatorial ballot test. With 45% of voters having no opinion or unfamiliar with him, challenger State Senator Tom Sherman has room to grow. However, his efforts to make up ground on the ballot test will face resistance from Sununu's strong 59%-39% favorability, which includes a 30% favorable image among voters that identify as Democratic.
- The political environment remains poor for Democratic incumbents. 69% of voters believe the country is on the wrong track, deteriorating slightly from 68% in August. President Joe Biden's image has improved slightly, but is still underwater at 44%-54% favorable. Hassan's and Pappas' images are also underwater at 48%-51% and 47%-48% respectively, while Kuster's is slightly better than even at 48%-46%. Democrats now lead on the generic ballot, 48%-46%, but this is largely a function of the abstract giving way to the concrete now that all contestants are known.
- Nonetheless, Republican challengers begin the general election campaign at a disadvantage. None of the Republican nominees has a positive image: Senate nominee Don Bolduc is underwater at 41%-51% favorable while 1st Congressional District nominee Karoline Leavitt is at 39%-45% and 2nd Congressional District nominee Robert Burns is at 26%-27%.
- Voter concerns favor Republicans. The issue most important in determining voting choice is economy/inflation, cited by 33% of voters. 77% believe that inflation is a greater problem than it was six months ago, and almost half blame inflation on Biden (27%) or Congressional Democrats (21%). Economic optimism is poor, with 58% planning to spend less during the upcoming holiday season than last year's while only 8% plan to spend more. 51% would prefer a candidate that would serve as a check on Biden's power, while only 38% would prefer a candidate that would help him enact his agenda.
- Democrats drew the challengers of their choice. In a successful tactic sure to be become more widespread in coming cycles, Democratic groups spent millions of dollars to help secure the nominations of explicitly pro-Trump Republican candidates. These nominees now face a general electorate in


which 52% of voters have a strongly unfavorable opinion of the former president.


- Trump and the Supreme Court decision on abortion have polarized and energized Democratic voters. Abortion is now cited by 20% of voters as their most important issue, up from 12% (see August survey for comprehensive data on voter attitudes on abortion). 97% of Democratic voters have a strongly unfavorable opinion of Trump. These two factors have driven the current messaging environment, which in turn has driven the attention of Democratic voters higher (79% paying "a lot of attention to the election") than that of Republican voters (74%). Partisan intensity is significantly higher for Democratic candidates than Republican candidates: 94% of Democratic voters have already lined up behind Hassan while only 83% of Republican voters currently favor Bolduc. In the 1st District, Pappas enjoys 95% support from Democrats while Leavitt has attracted 87% support from Republicans. In the 2nd District, Kuster is supported by 90% of Democrats while Burns has only 73% of Republicans.
- Incumbents are leading their challengers in support from undeclared voters. 49% of undeclareds favor Hassan while 41% favor Bolduc. Pappas leads Leavitt among undeclareds 51%-29%, while Kuster leads 47%-33%.
- Democratic voter intensity and undeclared voter preference has built a ballot test lead for Democratic incumbents. Hassan currently leads Bolduc 49%-43%, while Pappas leads Leavitt 49%-41% and Kuster leads Burns 49%-35%
- Hassan, Pappas and Kuster will likely be re-elected if they can keep voters' attention focused on Trump and abortion. The weight of message disparity between the incumbents and their challengers is driving their ballot test advantage, not their underlying strength as candidates. All three have the resources they need to maintain this disparity.
- Bolduc, Leavitt and Burns will need to re-focus voters' attention on the economy and Biden to overtake the incumbents. All three incumbent Democrats are below 50% on the ballot test, and none of the three are popular among voters. Nonetheless, a winning challenge will have to be fought on political terrain more favorable than that which the incumbents have successfully laid out.







