# A SURVEY OF REGISTERED NH VOTERS

August 26-27, 2025

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# **Survey Notes**

These results are from a Saint Anselm College Survey Center poll based on online surveys of 1776 New Hampshire registered voters. Surveys were collected between August 26<sup>th</sup> and 27<sup>th</sup>, 2025, from cell phone users randomly drawn from a sample of registered voters reflecting the demographic and partisan characteristics of the voting population. Names were presented in random order for the favorability and ballot tests. The survey has an overall margin of sampling error of +/- 2.3% with a confidence interval of 95%. The data are weighted for age, gender, geography, and education based on a voter demographic model derived from historical voting patterns, but are not weighted by party registration or party identification.

# **Summary**

New Hampshire Institute of Politics Executive Director Neil Levesque summarized the results, saying, "President Donald Trump's post-election bump has dissipated, setting up early leads for Democratic candidates in the upcoming federal office races. Looking ahead to the 2028 New Hampshire Presidential Primary, Vice President JD Vance is the early overwhelming favorite of Republicans, while repeat candidate Pete Buttigieg and California Governor Gavin Newsom battle for the top spot among Democrats. Buttigieg looks to build on his strong showing in the last primary, while Newsom has been successful thus far in introducing himself to Granite State voters."

President Donald Trump's popularity has settled back to his pre-election level. Trump's favorability, which had climbed to 45%-53% after his inauguration, has reverted to 43%-57%, in line with his historical levels.

**Voter optimism has receded somewhat.** After a high of 44% on our last poll in March, 40% now believe the country is headed in the right direction, while 56% believe that it is on the wrong track.

The political environment continues to favor Democratic candidates. Democrats lead on the generic ballot by six points, 50%-44%. This is a significant improvement from March, when Democrats held a narrow lead, 47%-46%.

Elections/Democracy has vaulted over Economy/Inflation as voters' top issue. 31% are now most concerned about how government reflects the voters' will as economic concerns have receded somewhat. This change is led by Democratic voters, 52% of whom now cite this as their top concern.

In a highly polarized environment, Governor Kelly Ayotte is relatively well-liked. Ayotte manages a slim plurality of voters on her popularity, with 49% having a favorable opinion of her against 46% unfavorable.

Repeat contender Scott Brown is an early favorite over State Senator Dan Innis for the Republican nomination for United States Senate. If the primary election were held today, Brown would be the choice of 48% of Republican voters while Innis would draw just 13%.

Congressman Chris Pappas is a favorite against either Republican candidate in the race for United States Senate. Against Republican favorite Brown, Pappas leads by 11 points, 48%-37%. His margin is even greater against Innis, 48%-30%.


Freshman Congresswoman Maggie Goodlander has settled into her office and is an early favorite for re-election. In a repeat match-up against 2024 foe Lily Tang Williams, Goodlander currently enjoys a strong 18-point lead, 49%-31%.


While the Republican Congressional primary in the 1st District lacks definition, former Portsmouth City Councilor Stefany Shaheen has converted her familiar name into an early lead for the Democratic nomination. Repeat candidate Chris Bright currently leads the Republican field with 8%, but 85% of voters remain uncommitted. Shaheen enjoys a strong lead over repeat candidate Maura Sullivan, 23%-9%, while 4 candidates split 9% between them.

**JD Vance** is the clear choice of Republicans to succeed Trump as the party's standard bearer. 56% would support the Vice President if the New Hampshire Primary were held today, with Florida Governor Ron DeSantis (8%), Secretary of State Marco Rubio (7%), and Director of National Intelligence Tulsi Gabbard (5%) leading the rest of the field.


Pete Buttigieg and Gavin Newsom are early favorites in the Democratic Primary. Buttigieg and Newsom both enjoy the support of 23% of Democratic voters, trailed by Illinois Governor JB Pritzker (9%), Congresswoman Alexandria Ocasio-Cortez (7%), and 2024 nominee Kamala Harris (6%).



















U.S. Senate Ballot: Pappas v. Brown




U.S. Senate Ballot: Pappas v. Innis




### **CD-2 General Election:** Goodlander v. Williams
