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SURVEY NOTES

These results are from a Saint Anselm College Survey Center online poll conducted on behalf of the Saint Anselm College Center for Ethics in Society based on online surveys of 520 New Hampshire registered voters. Surveys were collected between May 19th and 20th, 2022, from cell phone users randomly drawn from a sample of registered voters reflecting the demographic and partisan characteristics of the voting population. The survey has an overall margin of sampling error of +/- 4.3% with a confidence interval of 95%. Wording on the first question was rotated through a split sample. The data are weighted for age, gender, geography, and education based on a voter demographic model derived from historical voting patterns, but are not weighted by party registration or party identification.

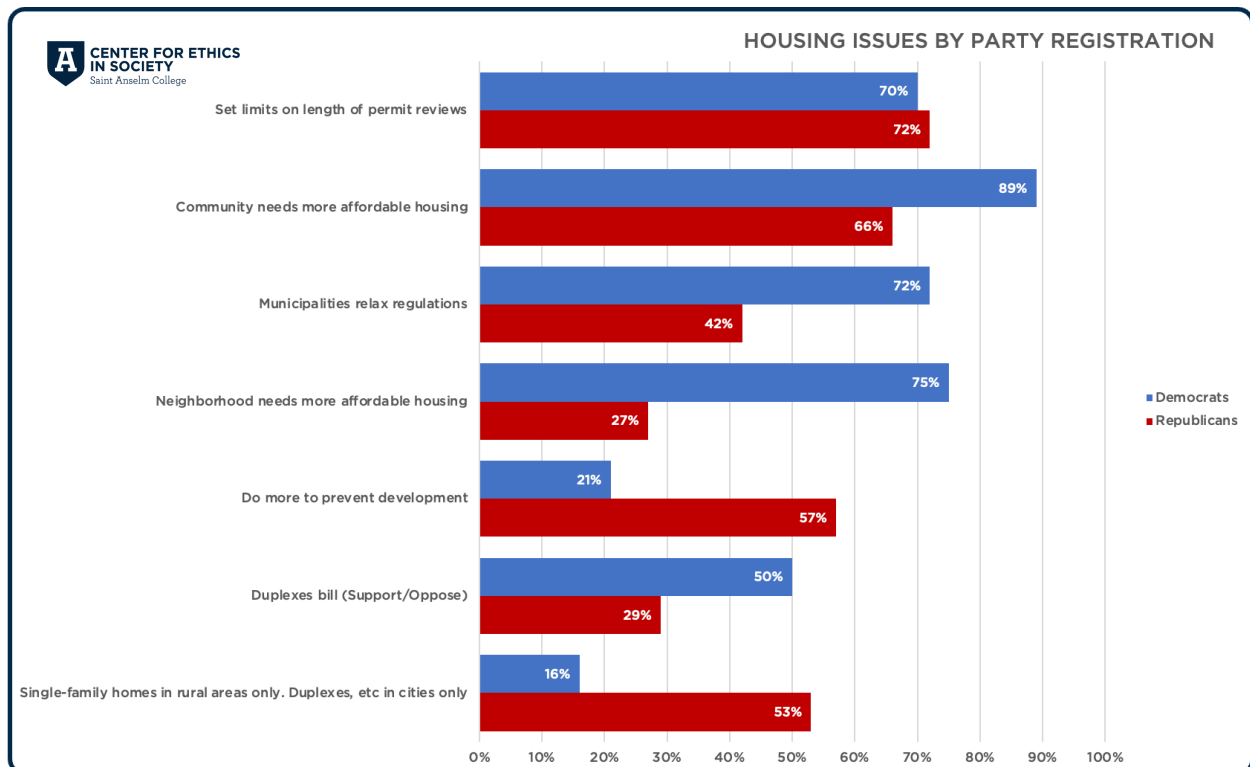
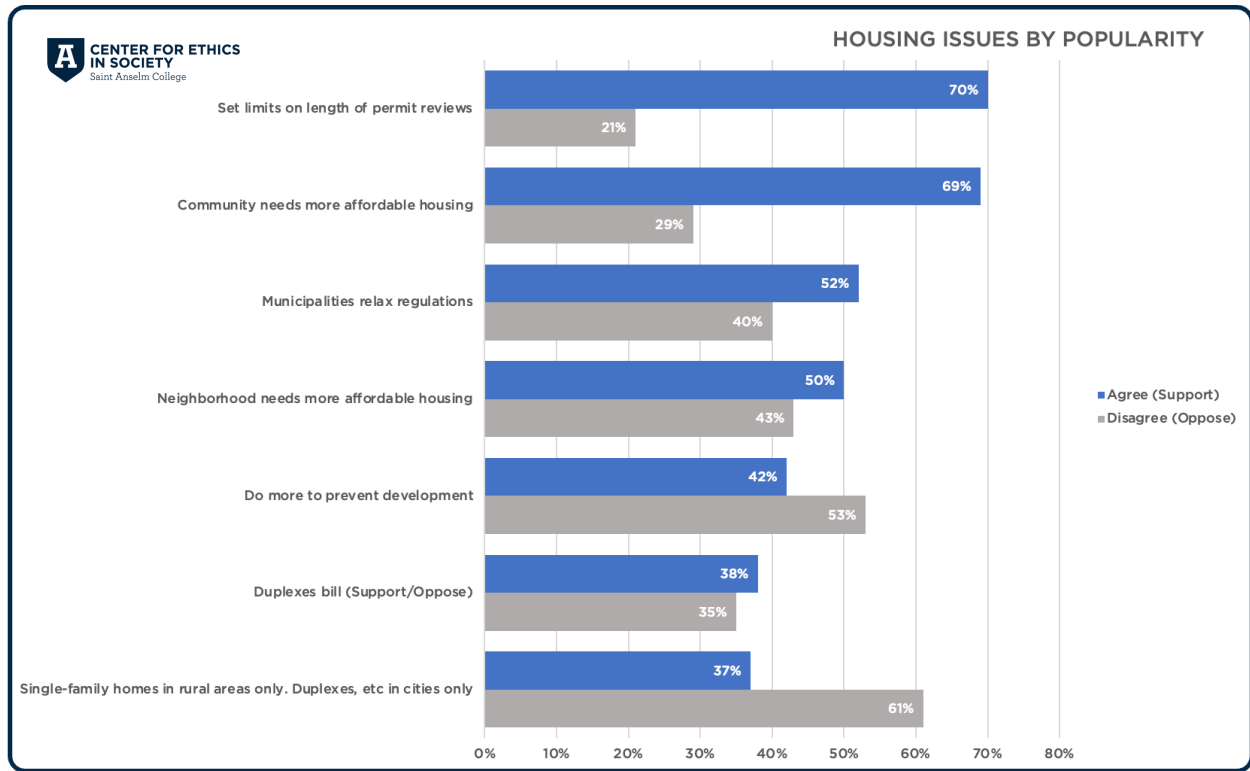
