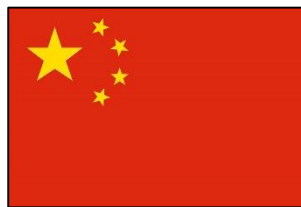
Chinese -- 中文

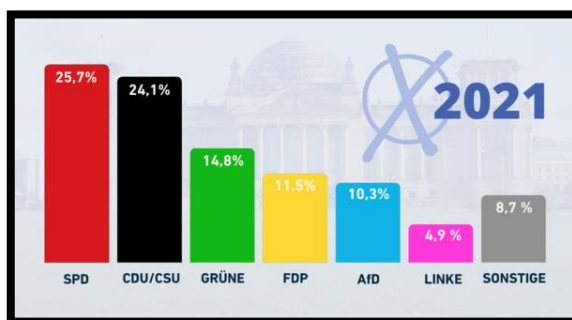
GR150: German II: MWF 1:30-2:20

Deutsch ist supergeil! The primary emphasis in this course is placed on the development of written and spoken German through the discussion of contemporary topics in Germany, Austria and Switzerland. An introduction to advanced grammar, vocabulary-building with exercises in composition, syntax and stylistics are included. Students will continue to improve their German language skills through discussing short German-language texts and feature films. GR 301 involves three class meetings and one weekly conversation session with a Native Speaker.

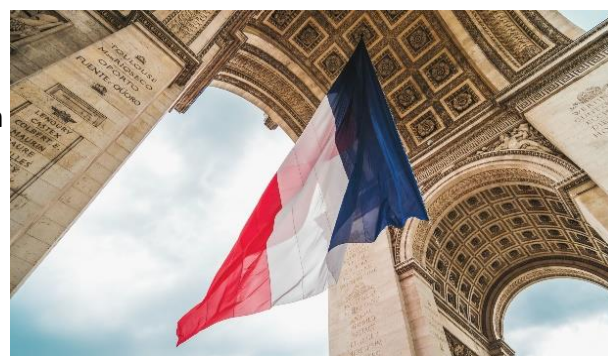
