


NEW RESOURCES

Geisel Library has acquired several new research databases over the summer, spanning the range of disciplines studied at Saint Anselm College. They can be accessed through the [Find Articles and Databases](#) page on the library website, or through the links below. If you have questions about how to use one of these databases, please contact the [Reference Department](#).

[ABI INFORM](#) provides citations and abstracts from over 2,000 business and management periodicals, including academic journals and trade publications. It includes citations to numerous peer-reviewed journals offering scholarly analysis of industry trends and company developments.




[BibleWorks](#) is an electronic Bible concordance that provides tools for exegesis and morphological research. It includes texts of the Hebrew Old Testament, Greek Old and New Testaments, and a wide range of English and modern foreign language translations. It also contains Bible dictionaries and other research aids. This database is located only in the Library on PC67; please ask the Reference Desk for assistance.

[BioOne](#) houses the full-text of over 100 high-impact bioscience, environmental science, and ecology research journals. Most are published by small scientific societies and non-commercial publishers, and are unavailable through other biology journal databases.

[Encyclopedia of Religion](#) is the online version of a seminal 15-volume reference work that includes over 3,000 lengthy articles about religious and theological topics. The encyclopedia encompasses theoretical, practical, and sociological perspectives on religion, including cross-cultural looks at different religious traditions. This second edition includes 600 new articles plus updates to many of the original entries.

[Grove Art Online](#) provides access to the full contents of The Grove Dictionary of Art and The Oxford Companion to Western Art, two highly-regarded multi-volume reference resources in the fine arts. View over 3000 thumbnail art images, conduct keyword searches, or browse the database by geographic area, time period, or art form.

[Historical Statistics of the United States](#) is a comprehensive compendium of statistics providing a quantitative history of the United States, with over 37,000 data series on topics such as health, crime, migration, and the economy. The searchable online version allows you to create customized tables and download data series for processing in a spreadsheet.



[International Medieval Bibliography](#) is a searchable online version of the IMB providing comprehensive indexing of scholarly journals and conference proceedings in the interdisciplinary field of medieval studies. Bibliographic records are available for 4,500 periodicals, with quarterly updates ensuring access to the latest articles. It is available on campus only.

[JSTOR Arts and Sciences III Collection](#) adds the full-text archives of 150 scholarly journals to Geisel Library's JSTOR subscription. This collection includes core titles in language and literature along with journals in the disciplines of music, film studies, folklore, performing arts, religion, and art history. Check the [Title List](#) to see a listing of the new journals.

[MathSciNet](#) is the preeminent electronic index to the scholarly literature of mathematics, containing abstracts and citation information on nearly two million journal articles. It also offers citation searching capabilities that enable you to trace ideas through the literature.

[Oxford Encyclopedia of American Literature](#) provides in-depth essays on American literature from the 1600s through the present. Author entries provide both biographical information and commentary on works, while other entries revolve around particular literary movements, periods, and themes. The essays address not only literary works but also the historical and social contexts in which they were written.

[Praeger Security International Online](#) provides in-depth analysis of terrorism and security issues, including weekly commentaries along with the full text of over 600 books and encyclopedias. PSI also includes an archive of over 1,000 security-related primary source documents (mostly from the US government) and a searchable chronology of terrorist incidents. The keyword search box enables you to quickly locate relevant titles, reference book entries, and documents.

[World Development Indicators Online](#) contains country-by-country time series data on over 600 development indicators, including variables related to health, education, trade, the economy, and the environment in each country. The step-by-step data selection procedure enables easy creation and download of data tables for analysis.


New Library Staff



Exhibit to Feature Political Cartoons from the College Archives


Political cartoons voice opinions and views on public issues and leaders. The artists who make these cartoons creatively dissect current events to inform and persuade their readers. On exhibit this fall at the library are original cartoon panels from the late 1970s by Jim Dobbins, the former editorial cartoonist at the *Union Leader*. A figure whose cartoons raised the ire of Jimmy Hoffa in the late 1950s, Dobbins' *Union Leader* cartoons are equally provocative and cover politics (state, national, and international), the oil crisis, Iran, and social activism. The original artwork from the College Archives offers a unique opportunity to view this type of communication in its raw form.


LexisNexis Has Changed

[LexisNexis](#) completely overhauled the look and feel of its database in July. In addition to a more intuitive interface, the new version offers enhancements such as improved subject indexing and clustering of search results by source and subject. 



Collection Analysis Underway at Geisel Library

This past summer, Betsy Holmes and Jeff Waller began an analysis of the library collection, utilizing new web-based tools. Geisel Library has recently purchased access to Resources for College Libraries (RCL), a highly selective core list of more than 60,000 titles in all subjects, including books and electronic resources (CD-ROM and subscription databases, web sites, and audio and visual media in various formats). Several hundred contributors have worked to create this core list for a hypothetical college or small university that concentrates on the traditional liberal arts and sciences curriculum, but also offers undergraduate-level courses in business, computer science, education, engineering and the health sciences.



RCL is interconnected with a collection analysis tool, allowing us to compare our current library holdings against those in the recommended core. We are in the early stages of this analysis, and look forward to seeing how we stack up against the pundits' recommendations.

NEW REFERENCE BOOKS

Here are a few of our newest titles for you to review. New books can be viewed monthly on the Library's website under [New Books](#).

Current Medical Diagnosis and Treatment (Lange, 2007 ed.)

Ref RC71 .A14

This renowned clinical reference companion offers up-to-date, authoritative coverage of over 1,000 common diseases and disorders, including symptoms, treatment strategies, and prevention tips. Entries are organized by topic (such as dermatology, endocrine, and obstetrics) and span the full range of primary care medicine. Geisel Library also purchased an updated (2006) edition of the *Merck Manual of Diagnosis and Therapy* (Ref RC55 .M4).

Encyclopedia of Politics and Religion

Ref BL65 .P7 E53 2007

In the course of nearly 300 topical essays, this encyclopedia explores the interrelationship of politics and religion in shaping social attitudes and public policy throughout the world. These essays address individual countries, religious traditions, and policy spheres, providing historical context, analysis of the current situation, and bibliographies for further reading. The appendix offers a collection of international documents pertaining to politics and religion.

Encyclopedia of Measurement and Statistics

Ref HA29 .S2363 2007

Targeted especially to beginning and intermediate students of statistics, this three-volume reference provides approachable descriptions of statistical concepts, tests, and techniques. The approximately 500 entries blend descriptive text with equations and illustrations to present clear explanations of concepts such as sample size, ANOVA, and t-tests. Examples are drawn from a wide array of social and behavioral science applications. This is recommended as a reference for any statistical methods courses.

International Encyclopedia of Adolescence

Ref HQ796 .I58 2007

This encyclopedia offers an in-depth examination of adolescent development (defined herein as ages 10-25) in countries around the world. Each essay takes up the present-day experience of adolescence in a particular country, with sections on issues such as religious beliefs, gender issues, education, health, and youth culture. For each country, there is an extensive bibliography of further reading, and interesting statistics are interspersed throughout.

Encyclopedia of Western Colonialism Since 1450

Ref JV22 .E535 2007

This three-volume work on imperialism and colonial history offers over 400 entries on the experience of colonialism in specific countries, independence movements, key historical figures, and the development of major empires. Other thematic essays explore topics such as colonial literature, race relations, and imperialist ideologies. This encyclopedia provides valuable background for history courses but also helps contextualize literature set in developing nations during the colonial era.

Encyclopedia of Science, Technology, and Ethics

Ref Q175.35 .E53 2005

As a complement to our more focused *Encyclopedia of Bioethics*, this four-volume encyclopedia examines the ethical issues and dilemmas raised by modern science and technology. Its 670 entries embrace a wide range of topics, including specific technologies and ethicists as well as broader subjects such as social engineering, genetics, and environmental justice. In addition to discussions of traditional Western and Christian viewpoints, several essays offer perspectives from non-Western cultures.
