



SAINT ANSELM COLLEGE SURVEY CENTER OCTOBER 2018 POLL EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

These results are from the Saint Anselm College Survey Center poll based on interviews with 454 randomly-selected registered voters in the state of New Hampshire. Interviews were conducted by landline and cellular phone between October 10th and October 15th. The overall survey has a margin of sampling error of 4.6% with a confidence interval of 95%; the margin of sampling error on questions specific to the 1st and 2nd Congressional Districts is 6.5% and 6.6% respectively.

New Hampshire Institute of Politics Executive Director Neil Levesque summarized the results, saying, "With 3 weeks left until Election Day, the races for Governor and Congress are beginning to take shape in a highly polarized environment. Voters in both parties are highly motivated, with over 90% of Democrats and Republicans extremely likely to vote. 74% of voters in both parties report being more likely to vote because of President Trump, whereas the confirmation process of Justice Kavanaugh has intensified Republican interest in voting somewhat more than among Democrats, 65% to 58%.

"In the race for Governor, incumbent Chris Sununu currently maintains a 49%-39% lead over challenger Molly Kelly on the strength of an 88%-4% lead among Republican voters, 46%-34% among undeclared voters, and 54%-32% among men. Kelly leads among Democrats 80%-10% and has a slight lead with women, 45%-43%. This race will likely tighten as Kelly picks up uncommitted Democrats and undeclareds down the stretch.

"In the 1st Congressional District, Democrat Chris Pappas enjoys a 44%-36% margin over Republican Eddie Edwards. This edge is built on a large disparity in name identification, with 51% of voters having a positive impression of Pappas versus only 32% for Edwards. Pappas is also seen unfavorably by fewer voters, 22% to Edwards' 25%, and leads among undeclareds, 39%-32%. However, only 68% of Republican voters currently express a preference for their party's nominee, so Edwards has room in this competitive district to close the gap in the final weeks.

"Incumbent Annie Kuster leads her challenger, Republican Steve Negron, by a margin of 49%-22%. Negron will cut significantly into this margin as he becomes better known among Republican and undeclared voters. However, Kuster is as popular among her constituents as she has been at any point in her career, increasing her favorability by 7 points to 52% since our April poll, and will be tough to beat in this Democratic-leaning district.

"New Hampshire voters are not yet focused on the 2020 Presidential primary," Levesque concluded. "Only 26% of Democratic voters express an early candidate preference. On the Republican side, 30% of voters would support a primary challenger to President Trump, but only 11% have an early favorite. Receiving the most mentions from Democratic voters are Senator Elizabeth Warren with 15, former Vice President Joe Biden with 8, and Senator Bernie Sanders with 5. Governor John Kasich has the most mentions from Republican voters with 9, and demonstrates some early crossover appeal with 4 mentions from Democratic voters."
